Each year over a billion prescriptions are generated in primary care. Most of these medications are highly efficacious but a significant number have the potential to cause harm for patients. Deprived patient groups are more likely to receive medications associated with poor outcomes and less likely to receive protective agents. A systematic approach to reviewing these at-risk individuals can significantly improve health outcomes and working well initiatives.

Cancer Protect

The Stage of Cancer diagnosis is variable across different patient groups and is worse in some groups with higher risk, for example areas of socioeconomic deprivation and some ethnic groups.

Early-stage diagnosis is important to optimise cancer outcomes. A systematic approach to ensure that those at highest risk receive appropriate evaluation and surveillance should improve health outcomes and working well initiatives.
